

A REPORT OF THE ACTIVITIES OF THE CATHOLIC HEALTH CENTER MAYO-DARLE FOR THE YEAR 2007

PRESENTATION OF THE HEALTH CENTRE IN THE HEALTH AREA

1) HISTORY OF THE HEALTH CENTRE

The catholic health centre is operating in the health area of Mayo-Darle. It was started at the tin mine at koudja about 8km away from the present site, by the charity reverend sisters in the late 1940s. Sister Eileen was the nurse and Sister Ann Marie Le Rail was teaching home craft to women. The sisters were giving treatment to Christian sisters and others in the other miners in their convent. Later, the miners pleaded to the sisters to take the dispensary to a more accessible place since the convent was a private place and very much inaccessible to miners.

In the late 1960 and early 1970 the miners were closed up and as the people were disserting the area, the dispensary was almost closing up. At this time, two volunteers, Marie Therese and Colette (Volontaire du Progress Humanaire) came to work in the dispensary. The bishop of Ngaoundere made a call for any religious group to come and take over the running of the centre.

In 1976, the dispensary was transferred to Tiket, a quarter in the Mayo-Darle village using a rented department about 300m from the present site. The two volunteers were still the main personnel running the centre. In 1979, they constructed a structure in the present site made up of a few rooms. The Franciscan Sisters took over the management of the dispensary the same year just before transferring to the present site with Sister Gabriella as the pioneer Franciscan matron. Marie Therese and Colette worked with her just for a short while before leaving.

Up to date, the dispensary has had several matrons after Sister Gabriella; Sister Raphaela, Sister Gisela, Sister Gertrude, Sister Candida, Sister Mathilda, Sister Ruphina, Sister Felicitas, Sister Electa, Sister Emilia, and Presently Sister Solange. Now the centre has grown from one building to three blocks with a bed capacity of 42. It has an outpatient department, and an in patient department. It also has a third building with private rooms, dentistry, and a laundry. The center has pit latrines, a good well, a pipe born water and a solar electricity given by the mission. There is also a kitchen for the patients, and a small storage room for assorted things which is attached to the in patient department.

2) THE ACTIVITIES OF THE HEALTH CENTRE

The health center carries on integrated activities; curative, preventive, promotive, and rehabilitative, and a maternity.

Under the curative activities, consultation and admission, and treatment of patients are carried out with an average number of about 2000 consultations, 500 admissions, and 200 deliveries per year. As preventive activities, we do carry out infant welfare clinics (IWC), ante natal clinics (ANC). We also do prevention of mother to child transmission (PMTCT) of HIV during ANC. A counselor has been trained for this purpose, and the activity is being well implanted with an average number of 854 clients counseled on HIV/AIDS and average number of women who accept to do the test.

Under the promotive activities we do give health education, weighing of children and give vitamin A supplements. In the rehabilitative activity we do training of people on knitting, fabrication of soap, bread, omo, and others. We generally refer physiotherapy cases to SAJOCA Bafut.

3) OBJECTIVE PLAN TO BE ACHIEVED IN THE 2007OUR PLAN FOR THIS YEAR IS TO ACHIEVE THE FOLLOWING IF POSSIBLE:

- ❖ The purchase of a powerful generator
- ❖ The purchase of a small drilling machine for tooth filling
- ❖ Buying of an ultrasound machine
- ❖ Training of a staff on how to use the ultrasound machine
- ❖ Recruitment of a medical doctor
- ❖ The purchase of a D&C aspirator for dilatation and curettage
- ❖ Repairs of damages in the health centre and staff quarter
- ❖ Renovation and equipping of doctor's residence
- ❖ Buying a new computer machine
- ❖ The purchase of material for bed sheets and protection of mattresses
- ❖ Construction of a small theater room

4) WHAT HAS BEEN ACHIEVED SO FAR IN 2007

- ✓ D&C aspirator has been bought
- ✓ Bed sheet material has been bought
- ✓ Mattresses have been covered
- ✓ Wood for repairs have been bought
- ✓ Some repairs have been done in the health centre and the staff quarter
- ✓ A portable generator has been bought for the doctor's residence
- ✓ We have a medical doctor employed in the health centre
- ✓ We have just bought a powerful generator still to be installed
- ✓ An ultrasound machine has been bought

5) AWAITING PROJECTS

- Purchase of a computer and printer
- Construction of an operating room
- Completion of repairs in the health centre and staff quarter
- Buying of bed pans
- Acquiring an autoclave machine for sterilizing equipment
- Purchase of a drilling machine for tooth filling

6) POSSIBLE PROBLEMS OF THE HEALTH CENTRE

- ❖ Lack of adequate space and land
- ❖ Many unpaid bills
- ❖ Limited finances for the purchase of the important material and equipment and drugs in the health centre
- ❖ Debt to be paid for certain equipment got like the ultrasound machine
- ❖ Construction of the small operating room due to limited resources, finances
- ❖ Difficulty to purchase a drilling machine for tooth filling
- ❖ Referral hospital is far from the health centre
- ❖ Construction of an incinerator
